


We were then shephered by my friend Kirs to the historical home of Irish designer,

The architecture is being carefully restored and rebuilt and the gardens planted and cared for.




A beautiful tapestry rug designed by Eileen covers the tile floor of the bedroom.

Above the house are the original apartments built for visiting artists- modest housing in a most "unmodest " setting right on the Cote d'Azur.






A tiny spiral staircase winds its way to the roof of the house.
